Just let me or Jocelyn know if you are interested.





Armistice Day

As we mark the Armistice that largely (but not wholly) ended the slaughter of WW1, our minds inevitably and indubitably turn to that dreadful subject, the casualties of war. At the Cathedral, we remember ALL casualties at this time, not just those who died in battle.

In the transept, we have the colours from the Nelson, Marlborough and West Coast Regiment, the ensigns from *HMS Colne and Chelmer* and the battle ensign from *HMS Queen*. We also have a corner dedicated to the RNZAF at the 'West' end. These might all be poignant reminders of the cost of warfare on humankind.

Recently, a visitor complimented us on the Cathedral but asked pointedly why the 'big flag' had been allowed to get so dirty, and wondered why we didn't have it cleaned and restored. The question was clearly very well intentioned. The visitor had assumed that the ensigns from *Chelmer and Colne*, being under glass, were well protected, but that the great battle ensign from *Queen* had been allowed to deteriorate since being laid up.

I explained that the black staining on the ensign was from cordite. The ensign had been flown from the masthead during the Gallipoli landings, when *Queen*, a superannuated battleship fired salvo after salvo to provide cover for the landing soldiers. Instead of being the result of neglect, the black staining on the ensign was evidence of its authenticity. It remains in the transept as a symbol of remembrance for those who fell at that dreadful time.

Occasionally, I sit in the transept and look at that ensign. I conjure in my mind the barely imaginable deafening, disorienting thunder of the guns*, I imagine the air thick with cordite fumes, black and stinking, sufficient to stain the white ensign permanently. I imagine the thoughts and fears of those infanteers ferried to the shore in small boats while the 12" shells are flying over them, and suddenly the enormity of warfare becomes real. It's bad enough in my imagination: the reality is probably beyond all human imagination.




I'm not a pacifist, but my fervent hope is that the silent tokens and totems of warfare help us to remember the human cost of war. It's not just about nations' leaders saving face, it's about human lives.

We will remember them.

In Memory Of Parishioner Beatrice Clover

Beatrice passed away peacefully on Wednesday, October 30, 2024, aged 95 years. She will be fondly missed by many at the Cathedral. A Memorial Service to celebrate the life of Beatrice was held in the Cathedral on Thursday, November 21. The following is a eulogy given by her friend, Keitha King, at that service.

Firstly, thank you to Beatrice's family for inviting me to speak on behalf of her many friends. I feel very privileged but also humbled as I realise how much she meant to so many people.


Beatrice was an incredible person with a great sense of humour and an ability to express herself clearly. When she arrived in N.Z. she quickly made friends at the Cathedral and ended up sharing a pew with Liz Roberts, another recent U.K. immigrant. They had many mutual interests including a love for a meal of fish and chips. and a shared sense of humour. They often used to go to the Smokehouse in Mapua for a fish and chip lunch which they did to celebrate Beatrice's 91sr birthday. They would also travel to Blenheim and go on the Pelorus Mail Boat run to Kenepuru Sounds.

Shortly after arriving at the Cathedral, Beatrice became very involved in the Cathedral Care Team. She took a particular interest in the welfare of those attending the midweek Wednesday service. Beatrice remained an active participant of this group right up until a few months ago. As long as she was able, Beatrice was a faithful attendee of the AAW (Association of Anglican Women), the Meditation Group, the Exercise Group, the Walking Group, Cameo, and the Craft Group. Here she spent week after week threading ribbons through the tags for the Memory Trees. She was also anxious to be part of the Light Nelson Festival and was very proactive, arranging for a wonderful tall candelabra to be picked up from her daughter Vicky.

Her home in South Street always had a pile of books open, particularly meditation books and her Bible. She loved her garden although she was pleased when the Camelia tree was taken away as the dropping flowers were so untidy.

The view of the Cathedral from her garden was a real comfort to her. She especially loved seeing the flag flying on the Tower. She took great pleasure one year in purchasing a new flag when its predecessor was looking decidedly tatty.

If nothing else was happening, she could often be seen out on her regular and long walks or taking a quiet breather by the Church steps. A few months ago, she was seen on an outing, complete with warm jacket, knee rug, cycle helmet and googles being peddled past Founders in the Wood Rickshaw. Beatrice liked Pooh Bear stories and she used to read them to herself and lately Sean would read them to her. She was disappointed, when after her accident, she was no longer able

Beatrice was a loving, kind and patient woman who truly lived her Faith. We will all miss this lovely, gentle person.
